Reading Scripture

"So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, ²⁷for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. ²⁸There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. ²⁹If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise" (Galatians 3:26-29).

Reading Scripture

- About salvation (all are heirs of the promise)
- But also about the nature of the church
 - Jew & Gentile Romans, Galatians
 - \bullet Slave or Free Philemon
 - Male or Female...

NT Women in Ministry

- Phoebe deacon, benefactor, and first interpreter of Paul's letter to the Romans (Romans 16:1-2)
- Pricilla teacher and co-worker of Paul (Acts 18; Romans 16:3; 1Cor 16:19; 2Tim 4:19)
- Junia an apostle (Romans 16:7)
- Euodia & Syntyche leaders in the church at Philippi (Philippians 4:2-3)

Paul's Prohibition

- But what about 1Timothy 2:11-15?
 - Purpose of 1Timothy: Correcting the false teaching that has come upon Ephesus (1Tim 1:3-7; Acts 20:17-38)

Paul's Prohibition

"A woman should learn in quietness and full submission. ¹²I do not permit a woman to teach or to assume authority over a man; she must be quiet. ¹³For Adam was formed first, then Eve. ¹⁴And Adam was not the one deceived; it was the woman who was deceived and became a sinner. ¹⁵But women will be saved through childbearing—if they continue in faith, love and holiness with propriety" (1 Timothy 2:11-15).

Paul's Prohibition

- Relates Paul's prohibitions to Ephesus
 - Experiencing problems with false teaching
 - Women were particularly enamoured with aspects of the false teaching (encouraged by Roman views)
 - Considering the lack of formal education available to women the prohibition was acceptable in its time and place

Conclusions

- Actively support women who are called by God and gifted by the Holy Spirit for servant leadership
- Provide examples of women serving in the church for young leaders

Conclusions

- Include the voices and stories of women of all colors, races, and cultural contexts
- Lovingly challenge systems that reinforce the fallen structures of oppressive patriarchy and work towards justice and reconciliation (#metoo, #churchtoo)
